Pastor's Report

In the fall of 2022 when we began the journey that we have called our Thriving Congregations Initiative, we committed to a couple of important things. We committed to read the scriptures and pray together, sensitive to listening to God's leading for our life together. We committed to practices that would strengthen the relational fabric of the congregation. And we pledged to a sense of mission that would send us into the local community, thinning the walls between church and world.

2024 is the year that we have begun to see the fruits of those commitments. God has been good. God has answered our prayers and has led us to some invigorating new horizons of mission and ministry. In 2024, we began hosting monthly potluck dinners as a way to draw us closer together in fellowship. Those gathering have been popular and well-attended far beyond my expectations and have proved how good it is to be together and how much we crave opportunities to build the relational fabric of our congregation. A new men's fellowship and faith group was started, feeding both the relational and the faith needs of men of our congregation. We experienced our first year of a community garden that we hope will grow and prosper as a way to use our congregational assets for the benefit of

After studying and distilling the data from hundreds of one-on-one meetings and a round of house meetings, we determined two areas we would focus on: meeting the needs of the seniors of our congregation and outreach to the community. A Research and Action Team was formed in the late summer to address the focus on meeting the needs of seniors. That team completed their work in December and offered recommendations to the council; those recommendations will issue in concrete action early in 2025. The Research and Action Team for community outreach will begin their work in January 2025.

In addition to this important work, the basic foundation of our congregation's life continues. Every week, we gather around word and sacrament to listen to the word, to pray, to sing and praise, to support and hold each other up — in short to be built into the body of Christ in this place and to do Christ's work in this place. Our worship life brings a quality experience each and every week. In our worship life, we bade farewell to Greg Beem as our principal organist. And though we knew it would be difficult to find a competent organist to continue our tradition of high-quality worship, God has provided a new organist, Randy Manges, whom we welcome in January. After a long hiatus due to the pandemic, members of our congregation were able to resume their annual mission trip to Guatemala, providing important relief and sharing the love of Christ.

Klaud's Pantry continues to thrive and to offer hope and relief to struggling families in Door County, Both members and the larger community have been generous in supporting this ministry that unfortunately, is needed by many members of our community.

Programmatic elements of our congregation that have been part of our ministry for a long time continue: regular visits to the sick and shut-in, ministry to and with children, youth, and families, a strong music program to support our Sunday morning worship, bible studies, providing comfort and ritual to families grieving the death of loved ones, and service opportunities.

I am thankful to work with such a capable staff who are hard-working, dedicated and so good at what they do. In addition, I give thanks for competent and high-functioning congregational leaders. No one person can lead a congregation to its best ministry. It takes a team, and the leadership team at Shepherd of the Bay is outstanding.

Together we are building a warm and inviting congregation that people want to be part of. Over the past 2 years, we have welcomed 30 new members, representing 15 households. In addition, each week we welcome regular attendees who for their own reasons do not wish to become members, but who have by their action indicated that Shepherd of the Bay is their church home.

Read any expert about the future of congregational ministry and you will hear one consistent theme: the nature of congregational ministry is changing and the tried and true strategies for congregational vitality will not work into the future. There is no blueprint and there is no one size fits all solution. Each congregation will have to figure out how they will be part of God's mission in the world and be diligent in a constant listening and discerning for God's guiding and for opportunities for service and growth. And that is what we are doing. And that is the work that God is blessing.

Finally I want to thank you for the priviledge of serving as the president and now look forward to continue working on the council to find more ways to demonstrate our faith and gratitude for the blessings that surround us.

Children, Youth, and Family Ministry

As I flipped over my "Star Card" this Epiphany season, and the word, "Gratitude" appeared, I was struck by how spot on this word has been for our children, youth, and family ministry, within this past year! There is much to be grateful for, in the light of faith formation here at Shepherd of the Bay!

Third Sundays, Pancakes and Praise

September through May, each third Sunday, following Communion, children and families join us upstairs for a pancake breakfast followed by a time of faith formation for the entire family! Pancakes and Praise Sundays have been very successful, averaging five families in regular attendance. The other Sundays in the month, Sunday School for children ages 4-grade 6, follows the Children's message, and is located in the conference room, first floor. We have averaged six children in attendance. We added "Worship Celebration" bags as an opportunity to follow and learn the order of worship, and contribute our "tithe" in the form of gratitude.

Little Lambs Bible Story Hour

Each Thursday morning, October through May, from 9:30-10:45 a.m., infants, toddlers, preschoolers and their care- providers are invited for a time of free play, Bible stories, art, music, games, and more! This year, we have four families who are members of other churches in the community, and one family from Shepherd of the Bay. The age has shifted from a preschool format to infants and toddlers, because of the make up of the children.

Wonderful Wednesdays

Every first and third Wednesday, from October through May, Gibraltar school students in Kindergarten through sixth grade are transported by the Shepherd of the Bay van, for a time of fun and fellowship, Bible stories, art, music, special guests, games, snacks, service, and more. The first half of 2024, we averaged 15 children. The second half we averaged 10 children. The direct result of our lower attendance stems from alternative after school programs offered through out the community on Wednesday nights.

Summer Wonderful Wednesdays

Children ages four through grade six, may register to spend five Wonderful Wednesdays from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at SOTB for a full day of fun, Bible Stories, music, arts and crafts, games, free play, water splash fun, movies, special guests, and a culminating field trip! The summer of 2024, we averaged fifteen children, with half from Shepherd of the Bay, and the other half, either vacation visitors, or coming from other churches. Our field trip was to "The Vault" for ice cream floats, then onto Ellison Bay Beach for fun in the sun.

Confirmation

The first three Wednesdays of each month, Pastor Jim and Lynda Pietruszka alternate instruction for two students, Kenzie Thomas and Erik Wolfe. Addison Schauke, a third student, receives Confirmation instruction from Pastor Jim, on line, because she resides in Sturgeon Bay. The remainder of the month provides opportunities for retreats, fellowship, field trips, service and outreach. Students are encouraged to attend the Synod Youth retreat, "Journey with Jesus", and Confirmation camp in the summer. Reaghan Buchner received her Reaffirmation of Baptism, and was Confirmed in May of 2024.

High School Youth

September through May, every second and fourth Wednesday from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m., students in grades nine through twelve, gather for fun, fellowship, devotion, reflection, and planning for the next big event or community service! February retreat, Spring 30 Hour Famine, and Summer travel! High School average attendance three to six students, but climbs during special events, as our students are good to invite friends from the community. We celebrated the graduation of the following students on high school senior Sunday, May 2024: Vanessa DeMarinis, Cooper Gaddes, McKailey Reisen, Chloe Alexander, Jamie Appel, and Abbey Nelson. High School students attended the National Youth Gathering in New Orleans, summer of 2024; Carenna Reisen, and Bobby Opper. High School students participated in a mission trip to Duluth, MN through Youth Works; Bobby Opper, Xavier Gaddes, Cosette Orrick, and Reaghan Buchner. Students also participated in the Synod Youth Gathering retreat, "Journey with Jesus", at Imago Dei in February of 2024.

<u>Nursery</u>

The nursery is used for gathering and play for Thursday Little Lambs. The nursery is open Sunday mornings and during special events. The nursery is a space for parents and care providers to spend time with their little ones during worship (the service is on intercom). There are age appropriate toys, a changing table, and a rocking chair for nursing, and a crib, available. Currently we have one family who visits the nursery on Sunday. They were invited to give input if staffing is needed. Currently there are no volunteers or paid staff for the nursery.

Prayground

On the east side of the Sanctuary, we provide a year round "Prayground" for small children, attending worship with their families. We also provide activity bags for young children. Both are stocked and changed seasonally by one of our faith formation volunteers.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

Shepherd of the Bay joined the six churches of Northern Door County the week of June 10-14, 2024 to have a Vacation Bible School (VBS) taking place at the First Baptist Church in Sister Bay. We welcomed 120 children, ranging from preschool to 6th grade. Registration takes place mainly online, making it easy for many kids who don't have a church home to get involved. This opens the door for new friendships and experiences, inviting them into a welcoming community.

The theme for VBS 2024 was "Come to the King" and was a collection of parables from the Matthew and Luke in the New Testament. These included the Prodigal Son, the Pearl of Great Price, the Good Samaritan, the Widow and the Unjust Judge.

The central teaching points were:

- 1. God's love and forgiveness is for all of us, no matter how much we have sinned.
- 2. Jesus calls us to share his love with others with humility.
- 3. God wants us to go to him in prayer for all we need.

As always, Shepherd of the Bay had a good turnout of adults, volunteers, and children. The Craft Committee is led by Kristi Appel and Carol Omernick. Bruce Foster edited the skits and curriculum, and Lynne Buchner directed the skits. We had many adults help with being tribal teachers, craft helpers, set up and taking down of the craft booths and tents, snack helpers, picnic lunch helpers, and clean up crew. Music Ministry

Continuity and change have been constant companions in the Music Ministry of Shepherd of the Bay in the year of 2024. Allow me to address the "change" aspect of this past year. Our organist, Greg Beem, served our church community faithfully for many years and just this October retired from his position after amending his position earlier in the year, finally retiring fully from our midst on October 1, 2024. While Greg was transitioning to a life of retirement, a very capable guest organist played our Sunday worship services with elegance and dedication. Scott Bourdeau came to us on many Sunday mornings, having crossed over Death's Door Passage from his home on Washington Island. Scott has been a good colleague, as was Greg before him. Shepherd of the Bay has been the happy recipient of these two talented and gifted musicians' work on numerous Sunday mornings during the year. Our church is grateful for their musicianship and their collegiality. We await the arrival of our new organist, Randall Manges, as he is due to begin his tenure "on the bench" with Shepherd of the Bay on January 19, 2025.

Before Greg resigned his position at Shepherd, he oversaw the refurbishment of our 20-year-old Dobson Tracker Organ by the talented personnel from the Dobson Organ Company in Lake City, Iowa. Because of this much needed attention by skilled artisans for a week in June, we should be able to enjoy this beautiful instrument on Sunday mornings for many years to come.

Attending to our two Steinway grand pianos in the sanctuary throughout the year has been our good friend and gifted piano technician, Peter J. Nehlsen. Peter travels to us from his home on Washington Island whenever we need our instruments tuned and, if need be, repaired. It is helpful for us to be reminded that this generous piano technician has never presented our church with a bill for his services, stating that this is his contribution as a Christian to the work of the church. We are grateful for his service.

Continuity has been the benchmark of the Music Department of Shepherd of the Bay this busy year! We have hosted many concert events in our sanctuary space:

Organists Karen Black and Charles Barland, Pianist Jonathan Bass, Colin & Friends Indigenous Music presentation, four separate chamber concerts by Midsummer Music and our own Shepherd Showcase, featuring the musicians from our Sanctuary Choir and various instrumentalists from our own church family.

During this year, we were sad to say a final goodbye to several of our Sanctuary Choir and other cherished church members, celebrating their funeral services together as a church: Carl Jackson, Gary Doudna, Lyle Amundson, Donna Hupe, David Aurelius, Phyllis Turner and beloved Gibraltar kindergarten teacher from the larger community, Margaret Loving. It is always such an honor to celebrate these wonderful people's lives in a final farewell of Christian love and remembrance.

One of the highlights of the Sanctuary Choir's year was the selection, purchase and arrival of our new choir robes with liturgical collars (signifying the four colors of the church year: red, blue, green and purple). Spearheading this project from beginning to end was Sheila Lundquist, ably assisted by Jill Lhost. What a worthy effort this was, a bigger project that either woman would have anticipated. We, as a choir, are very grateful for their leadership and perseverance. We wore these new robes and our red collars for the first time as we processed into the sanctuary, singing "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" on Reformation Sunday, October 27, 2024. (By the way, our old choir robes and collars have all been cleaned and are awaiting new homes! Perhaps someone reading this account will know of a choir in need of new robes! We would love to "pay them forward" to someone else's church choir. Contact Sheila or Jill or me. We are ready to ship them off for some new singers to wear!)

Along with our new choir robes (All God's Children Need a Robe!), we needed to find an adequate place to store them safely. In stepped Tom and Barb Tuttle, who purchased and installed curtain rods and new curtains to keep the robes clean and free of dust. Tom also built a second closet system for our "tall robes", allowing them to hang without dragging on the floor. We, as a Sanctuary Choir, are grateful beyond measure for the generosity, skill and kindness shown to us by Tom and Barb.

I mentioned earlier that we have outstanding instrumental musicians and talented singers in our Sanctuary Choir and Shepherd family and friends. Here are the folks that have participated in our church services this year, playing their instruments:

This is a very unusual circumstance for most church choirs, who normally take the summer off. The Sanctuary Choir of Shepherd of the Bay sings every Sunday, every season of the year. The summer months (June through September) the Sanctuary Choir transforms itself into that formidable force known as "Choir Lite", performing choral miracles every Sunday morning with a very limited rehearsal time before the service begins, with whomever walks through the rehearsal door and wants to sing that day. I added up the total number of Choral Anthems the Sanctuary Choir sang this past year: 71 different anthems within the 2024 calendar year! Outstanding output for an outstanding choir!

Finally, I would like to draw attention to a special event in June: The Musicians of Shepherd of the Bay presented an afternoon of music entitled "Shepherd Showcase". This offered an opportunity, spearheaded by Jim Grasse, to feature the musicians in our music family in a special way, singing choruses, playing instrumental pieces, singing solos and combining voices to create a variety of vocal ensembles. Thank you for the opportunity to serve this church community, which has evolved into a cherished family for me. I can hardly wait to discover what 2025 has to offer all of us!

Annual Report for Outreach Committee 2024

Thank you to everyone who has served in the various outreach activities offered by Shepherd of the Bay. These activities cannot happen without your generous gifts of time. "God is not unjust; he will not forget your work and the love you have shown him as you have helped his people and continue to help them." Hebrews 6:10

Bridges: Shepherd of the Bay hosted a Bridges event the end of August. There were 24 volunteers from our church, 7 from Orchard Fellowship, and 8 from Bridges. We served a meal, had a campfire with S'mores, volleyball, Segways, pickle ball, basketball, provided a craft, and tours of the tower. There were about 120 in attendance.

Habitat for Humanity/Housing Partnership: Volunteers from Shepherd of the Bay organized and provided meals for Habitat Humanity/Housing Partnership home build in Sister Bay. Shepherd of the Bay worked with eight other churches to provide meals. Two people from our church worked on a regular basis to help build the home. The home was completed in time for the family to move in by Christmas.

Christkindlmarkt: Shepherd of the Bay provided free transportation for the Sister Bay Historical society Christkindlmarkt again this year. The drivers received around \$500 in tips, which were given to Klaud's Pantry.

Mental Wellness Speaker and Fair

A committee has been working on a mental wellness resource event, scheduled for April 23, 2025. Tasha Schuh <u>https://www.tashaschuh.com/about</u> will speak at Gibraltar in the afternoon and at Shepherd of the Bay following the resource fair, which is from 4:30-6:30pm. Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry has made a home at Shepherd of the Bay for many years. However, it is currently undergoing a revitalization. Carol Omernick and Lynda Pietruszka both Stephen Ministers, participated in a ten week on-line training to become Stephen Leaders. Stephen Leaders equip our congregation's lay people to provide one-to-one Christian care to people in our congregation and community who are experiencing difficulties in their lives.

Stephen Ministry is a confidential ministry. The identity of those receiving care and everything they discuss with a Stephen Minister remain private. The minister takes on the role of "prayer giver" however, God, is the "cure giver". The minister is not a therapist, but an active listener, and can provide resources when needed.

Coming into the new year, we strive to:

•Contact ministries within Shepherd of the Bay, researching how Stephen Ministry might partner or benefit that ministry, while identifying potential care receivers.

•Identify those who might be called to train to become Stephen Ministers.

•Utilize the current resource collection from Stephen Ministry to assist other care providing ministries in the church.

•Educate the congregation to become familiar with Stephen Ministry, making it approachable, as we build a culture of "It's ok to ask for help".

•Begin offering training modules that not only benefit an incoming Stephen Minister, but anyone in a care giving role.

Guatemala Mission Trip

We partnered with Peace Lutheran Church in Antigo, WI, to send a team of 15 people to Guatemala. The members of Shepherd of the Bay traveling from March 19 to 27, 2024, included Nora Zacek, Gabi Solomon, Laney Zacek, Helen Cordon, and Carol Omernick.

The programs at Manos de Jesus in Guatemala are evolving after the pandemic, with a focus on building relationships within the community. One of the initiatives is a VBS-style soccer day camp. We also contributed by assisting in the tutoring center, providing small group English lessons for local children who fell behind in school during the pandemic. We visited the families of children attending the soccer camp as well as our sponsor families, bringing along blankets made by our WELCA quilters, food, and other essential items.

During our visit to Guatemala, we coincided with Holy Week when the children are on Easter break from school. To make the most of this time, we sponsored some fun activities for the kids, including a field day at one of the education program sites. The children were divided into teams, and we all enjoyed competing in various games. Additionally, we rented a park in a neighboring town that featured an outdoor pool. We played soccer, ultimate frisbee, enjoyed a picnic lunch of hot dogs, and swam in the pool. Many of the kids had never been to a pool before, and most did not know how to swim, but everyone had a great time!

A crucial aspect of building connections with the people of Guatemala is learning about their culture. We took a tour around the city of Chichicastenango, where Manos de Jesus is located, to gain insight into Mayan culture and traditions. Chichicastenango is one of the largest centers of idol worship in Guatemala, underscoring our mission to share the love of Jesus in this significant area. Our experience culminated in witnessing the solemn Good Friday celebrations in the city of Antigua, a UNESCO World Heritage site, where we observed the poignant Processions of the Cross, featuring beautifully adorned floats bearing statues of Jesus carrying the cross as they were carried through the streets for hours.

To support our mission, we continue to fundraise through events such as a water station at the Door County Half Marathon and a freezie pop station at the Door County Triathlon. We have also hosted two Lenten Meals.

Thriving Congregations

The Thriving Congregation program is to thicken the relationships within the church and to thin the walls with our communities. We have attended four training sessions, conducted by the Black Mountain School of Theology and Community at the Montreat Conference Center, in Montreat NC. The last one was completed in March, 2024. There was to be a fifth and final get together for all the churches that participated in our group in October to share their experiences but it was postponed due to the hurricane that caused so many damages in North Carolina.

During 2024, we invited thirty non team members- the Church Council, the Church Staff, and a selection of long term members, newer members, and people who winter in warmer places- to be trained to read and code the the minutes of the house meetings and to tell us what this data said to them and what areas we should focus on. Twenty-two people spent many hours on this task, and then met in small groups to tell us what they found- what was mentioned most often, what was most important, what would be most impactful.

The Thriving Congregation reviewed all of these groups findings, and decided on two areas to create research action teams. They were Senior Care and Community Engagement.

A charter was developed for the Senior Care team in the summer for the team to make recommendations by the end of 2024. The team was lead by Pat Skogsbakken, and the team members were Dick Burress, Carolyn Hitzeman Ruth Ann Hjelle, Nancy Megan, and Sue Provo. They researched what senior services were available in the area, connected about 30 seniors from SOTB, and conducted a written survey that was distributed at church and in the mail. They made their recommendations in December. We would like to thank them for all of their work. The Thriving Congregation team and Church Council will meet in January and February to make decisions about moving forward.

We initially intended to form the second team on Community Engagement in 2024, but due to a number of unforeseen circumstances, we will start that in early 2025.

There were a number of things that were started (or restarted after COVID) in 2023 or 2024 that didn't come from an action research team, but from an environment where people with shared interests stepped forward with ideas of things that would meet the needs of people within SOTB and the wider community. The Lenten service and meal series, exercise classes at church, the community garden, the welcome packets for new members, the directory of groups within the church, transportation for Chriskindlmart, transportation for social events, a game night, Social 6/7, a men's group, hosting an annual Bridges event, providing food for Habitat for Humanity workers, more bakers and helpers for fellowship on Sunday mornings, lay Eucharist ministers, just to name some examples.

As we start this new year, we ask that we all prayerfully pay attention to our church family and community. And pray for discernment as we make decisions on the Senior Care initiatives, start the Community Engagement research action team, and start another round of one on one meetings and house meetings to get to know each other better.

Non-CPA Audit Findings and Recommendations Letter

October 1, 2024

Shepherd of the Bay Lutheran Church 11836 State Hwy 42 Ellison Bay, WI 54210

Dear Council President, Audit Committee Chair or Finance Chair:

- Congregation Consulting Services Inc. (CCS Inc.) is pleased to have performed a Non-CPA Audit of your church for the year ended December 31, 2023.
- Based on audit work performed, the books and records of Shepherd of the Bay Lutheran Church appear to be materially accurate. Testing performed also found, with some exceptions as noted in this report, that the controls governing the financial operations process appear to be in place and operating as intended. Although controls over financial operations appear to be adequate, additional work could be done in the following areas that would help strengthen existing controls:
- Establish a Finance Committee. One was formed by Grace in the 1st Quarter of 2024.
- There is weakness in the Internal Controls in the Finance area because of the limited number of people available. These responsibilities fall almost entirely on the Treasurer. <u>Grace comments: I pay the bills and reconcile the checkbook- this could be separated to create oversight. I also</u> <u>report member contributions which also could be separated.</u>
- Implement the ELCA Congregation Records Retention Schedule ELCA recommends a 7 year retention which we will adhere to in the future.

In addition to the recommendations regarding existing controls, we made the following observations when performing our Non-CPA Audit:

• Pastor Honig's W-2 needed to be corrected to include the amount of his wages. *The initial payroll setup had an error which we corrected.*

- The Form I-9s (Employment Eligibility Verification) were not located. We recommend that Grace secure these for your current staff.
- Most invoices in our disbursements sample didn't contain any approval signatures. Grace explained that many of these vendors send invoices on a regular monthly basis.

- In doing our work on the disbursements, we found that there were a significant number of Voided Checks, particularly in the earlier part of the year. Also, there were a few checks missing in the sequence. <u>This occurred before I began my work as treasurer in March 2023</u>. The missing checks were later accounted for..
- The Bank Reconciliation for the General Fund Checking Account was materially off. We worked with Grace to go through the transactions in the General ledger and make corrections. That account now reconciles and the Balance Sheet was re-issued to reflect that change.
- There are two outstanding checks written out of the General Fund Checking Account that should be reviewed: Check 9960 written on 08/11/2023 to XXXXX for \$150.00 and Check 10048 written on 12/26/2023 to XXXXX for \$84.00. These had not cleared the bank as of 04/30/2024.

Names have been removed for the purpose of this report.

- Additional interest could have been, and still could be, earned especially in the Money Market Bank Account. A rough estimate of the interest is as much as \$6,250 (\$250,000 at 2.5%). <u>A CD is currently earning 4.4% till</u> <u>July</u>.
- The Weekly Counter Sheets had no signatures from the Counters. Also, several Envelopes were missing for the Sunday that we sampled. We also didn't find the Bank Deposit Slip, but the count sheet total did trace to the Bank Statement.

I keep the deposit report, slips, and receipts on file. Brian was not aware of that.

- The principal portion of debt payments should be reflected as a reduction in liability on the Balance Sheet, rather than as an expense on the Income Statement.
- This change was made.

I am not aware that the congregation had ever participated in any sort of outside review, and Congregation Consulting Services offered their services at a perfect time for this. This group does non-CPA audits for churches and small non-profits. The in-person work was done in two visits in June and September. I found the review to be very helpful, and I appreciate the opportunity to learn. Council agrees this should be repeated periodically. In the meantime, the Finance Committee and I will establish procedures for in-house reviews. Congregation Consulting fees with travel expenses total \$5,769 which was paid from the memorial fund.
