It was almost 17 years ago — hard to believe that it was that long ago — that I spent a few days with our older son walking up and down the Ligurian hills along the Mediterranean Sea in Italy. In my mind's eye, the sky was perfectly blue, the sunlight shimmered in reflection off the calm waters, the narrow paths snaked along steep drop-offs down to the water. It wasn't like wilderness hiking, because the paths connected five villages of Cinque Terre that lie only a few kilometers from each other. The paths wind through small farms of grape arbors, olive groves, and wild lemon trees. Still, the hiking was strenuous, steep up and downs and treacherous footing. I remember the experience vividly as some of the most enjoyable I've ever experienced; yet it's hard to describe. I guess you had to be there.

For centuries, God had been calling people into relationship, present, but not visible, maintaining the strict boundaries between Creator and creature. But at some point, God decided God just had to be here. The twist, however, is that God came, not to discover what it was like to be human, but so that we might know what God is really like.

In this advent season, we look with great anticipation to the coming of God among us. We stand with the prophets who looked for God's deliverance, with John the Baptist who paved the way for Jesus' coming, with Mary who wondered why and how she could be God's chosen vessel, with the generations who looked for and waited for the unveiling of God's reign.

In short, we look for the coming of the baby in Bethlehem, knowing that God has snuggled up right beside us, revealing a God who is not roaring with angry judgment, but appears unexpectedly, with kindness and mercy. God does not come with the raw power of empire, but comes gently, slowly, even hesitatingly. And God comes to the place that no one has ever heard of, in a place that no one would think to look, in the middle of people who have little hope. In the mystery of Advent and Christmas, we discover the inexplicable mystery that God is here, with me, with you, with us, with all of humanity, with all of creation. That's the good news. That's the Gospel.

Again this year, our Advent worship will be themed and will incorporate words for worship and sermons that carry the theme through the season. This year's theme is "Words for the Beginning." Advent is a season of endings and beginnings. As the calendar year comes to a close, a new church year begins. Christ's birth ushers us into new ways of living and loving; and yet, the world as we know it spins madly on. In many ways, pregnant Mary was surrounded by endings—large and small, personal and political. But Mary proclaimed hope in a God who was and is making all things new. Christ's birth offered a beautiful new beginning for shepherds and Magi alike—all the while, King Herod tried to bring Christ's story to an end. When we ourselves navigate seasons filled with endings and beginnings, we need reminders. We need words that can feel like steady ground, like a path for our feet to find as we step forward into the unknown.

Our Advent series this year will be filled with blessings, with the words we need to hear again and again as we begin a new season. We'll reflect on the words Mary would speak to her newborn son. What scriptures and stories would she impart to him? What lessons would she teach him as he grew? The weekly themes may feel like the lessons we teach to children, but in reality, these are lessons we continue to learn and relearn as adults. They may sound like the messages we impart to loved ones during special ceremonies or sacred rituals. The lessons are familiar ones, frequently used in weddings, ordination services, or baptisms. Yet, you are invited to enter this Advent season as if you are entering a sacred new chapter, holding fast to the reminders that will bolster you for the journey ahead. As you journey through this season, may you find words for belovedness and hope. May you find words for beginning again. No matter what you are facing, no matter what this new day brings, love is your beginning.

A blessed Advent and Christmas to all of you.

Guatemala Mission Trip

James 1:27

Join our team from Shepherd of the Bay on a short term mission trip to Guatemala February 21 - March 1, 2025. Last March, we had the privilege of serving the Lord through the organization Pray America/Manos de Jesus, working with Mayan widows and orphans. We built a house, repaired a house, installed a latrine, helped tutor kids in English, visited families, and played with kids all while we were building relationships with the people of Guatemala and each other.

Here is a recent post on Facebook from Manos de Jesus:

We are committed to being highly relational, walking with our kids, families, and staff to holistically realize a better future for all. Each name is known, each story is heard, and each person is embraced with love: as it is in heaven let it be on earth.

Youth are a short walk away as the education programs are nestled into their communities - such as the Chilima Education Program held at Monte Flor Campus. Relationships grow strong as more than half of the youth in our Soccer Academy are also enrolled in our Chilima Education Program - which means many of these students are connecting three times a week with coaches, teachers, missionaries, staff, and volunteers at Manos de Jesus. Kids and families experience belonging, grace, devotionals, support, and new learning experiences.

Leaders, teachers, and missionaries enjoy family outreach through home visits to connect with families, share a scripture or bible story, learn about the family's needs, and pray together. As part of the home visit, a gift of food, such as beans, pasta, corn, cereal, and eggs is brought as a blessing to the family. These are highly relational, meaningful times of sharing, prayer and connection for everyone who is able to be together.

There is still much work to be done, and this could be your opportunity to serve during a week-long mission trip to support Mayan women and children. The next mission trip is scheduled for February 21 to March 1, 2025.

We welcome people of all abilities and talents to join us. Our goal is to build a team of 10 to 15 participants, and many others who can support this project in various ways.

Please join us on Sunday, December 1st, at Shepherd of the Bay. We will have a short temple talk during the 9:30am service and then gather after the service to answer any questions you may have. If you are considering going on the trip, this is a great opportunity to ask questions and learn more.

If you cannot make it to the service but would like to discuss the trip, please let me know. Also, feel free to share this information with anyone you think may be interested.

The upcoming holiday season can be difficult for many people.

There are many reasons why people may be hurting during the holidays, including the loss of a loved one, a busy social calendar, or work deadlines. Here are some ways to support those who are hurting during the holidays:

- Ask how they are: Ask if they want to talk about their struggles or loss.
- Listen: Listen without trying to fix everything.
- Be present: Be present with them where they are hurting.
- Invite them to worship: Invite them to sit with you during a worship service.
- Pray for them: Pray silently for them during the worship service.
- Participate in a service project: such as ringing the Salvation Army bell, donating to charity, or making gifts of service.
- Validate their emotions: Let them know that their feelings are valid.
- Avoid statements that start with "Don't feel": Instead, try saying something like "I can tell you are feeling really down today".

The Reckoning of Time - Pr. Jim Honig

The Julian calendar is a uniquely worldly way of reckoning time. While we use the calendar in our worldly lives -- after all, we are in the world -- we have a different way of reckoning time when we gather as church. Our time hinges on the life, death, resurrection, and ascension of the One who came to bring us salvation. The church calendar is different than the Julian calendar. Our new year is not in January, but the First Sunday of Advent which begins a time of getting ready for Christ's coming. Then we celebrate Christmas as the coming of God to the world in human flesh; then Epiphany, the time in which we take note of Jesus appearing to the whole world. From there, we enter the season of Lent, a time of focus on Jesus suffering and death, and our own call to follow. The center of our church year is Holy Week, a time to focus on both Jesus' death and his resurrection. Then we celebrate his resurrection for a week of weeks -- seven weeks that take us to Pentecost and the birth of the church. All the Sundays after Pentecost -- and it varies each year according to how early or late Easter is -- are the time to reflect on our own calling to be the church in the world.

So while it seems tedious to announce the progressing Sundays of the Pentecost season, it is a reminder that we are in our own season of growth, of calling, and of discipleship. That season of growth, calling, and discipleship is a long one -- in fact, as long as life itself. So, we remember that each week with the announcement of our own church calendar, a weekly reminder that we reckon time differently in the church, a part of our larger collection of practices in which, though we are in the world, we are not of the world; and so we we live differently, including reckoning time differently.


