Limitations have never been something that I have wanted to admit. I have spent a good part of my life pushing myself to accomplish things that were hard. Finishing a marathon. Training for a century bike ride. Driving to a conference from Florida to Indiana without stopping except for gas and a bathroom break. Ok, I admit it; that one was pretty dumb, and I had the blood clots in my leg to prove it.



More recently, I have come to accept some of my limitations and pledged to work on accepting others that are more challenging. I love downhill skiing, but with two knee replacements, downhill skiing is in the rearview mirror. Maybe cross-country skiing? I have finished 6 marathons. And that will be it. No more marathons. I never wanted to live in New York City permanently, but I dreamed about living there for a year or two to experience it. That's not going to happen. I can't stay out as late as I used to and there are foods that I can no longer eat. You know what I'm getting at. You could make your own list.

I've been reading lately in some of the books by Oliver Burkeman. You might know him for his best-selling book, "Four Thousand Weeks." He starts by reminding us that our life span, on average, is about four thousand weeks. In the long scheme of things, that's a pretty short time. Limited, if you will. (By the way, I'd highly recommend not only that book but his more recent one, "Meditations for Mortals.") But he does not dwell on that chronological limitation as a depressing reality; rather it's freeing to be honest and real about the relatively short span of our lives and then make some decisions about how we will best use the limited time we have.

I've embraced the truth that recognizing limitations can actually be quite freeing. If it's clear that I'm never going to have my year in NYC, then quit thinking about it and plan for what's possible. I can't run 35 miles a week anymore, but I can certainly find joy in walking 20 miles a week. It does no good to think about the life that you wish you had; it's a good and holy thing to embrace the life that you do have, the wonderful life that God has given and that God inhabits, and that God has promised to bless.

Burkeman is merely doing a riff on the ancient wisdom of the psalmist, "Lord, teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom." I'm convinced that a heart of wisdom is to be able to do two things at once: one, to delight in the goodness of God and the wonder of each day's gifts and live in that day's gifts and embrace that day's gifts, and, two, to use the gifts of each day in service to our neighbor.

The one limitation that our Christian faith has burst, is the limitation of the grave. The Easter proclamation of Jesus' resurrection is the promise that the grave ushers us into a fuller and never-ending relationship with God. As you receive this newsletter, we are just a few weeks away from Holy Week and Easter. This year, we will again hold our Maundy Thursday service in Fellowship Hall with dinner around the table and devotional reflections on the meaning of the day an our entry into the Great Three Days. Many, many volunteers will be needed for the Maundy Thursday service. When the call goes out, think and pray about how you will be part of the celebration.

Good Friday will be a devotional reflection on Jesus' death for our life, and will take place in the sanctuary in the evening.

And finally, we will celebrate the Easter Feast, the Resurrection of our Lord, with a festival celebration in the sanctuary at 9:30 on Easter Sunday, April 20. The service will be ramp up our celebration in so many ways, including musically. I know you will be there; I hope you will invite friends and neighbors to join us for the celebration of our live in God and with God, all made real through Jesus' death and resurrection.

LOVE, THE GREATEST GIFT OF ALL

Hi, friends! As I was sitting here at my computer on a beautiful morning in March (okay, it's really cold and snow is covering all the outdoor surfaces, but the sun is shining brightly in a lovely blue sky), my thoughts turn to LOVE. Love of neighbor, love of family, love of community, love of oneself. God has given us a tremendous gift in the richness of life we enjoy each and every day. Building and Grounds Committee

After Services/Meals Turn Off Lights – Whoever is the last person out of the building after an event please turn off all the lights and close the fire curtain into the sanctuary. This is especially important on Sunday because Staff members do not always work on Mondays.

Snow Shoveling – Thank you, Les Keepper for volunteering to keep the sidewalks around the church clear of snow and ice this winter. There were some issues with both snow blowers in February but they were both fixed and back in working order quickly.

HVAC – The sanctuary humidifier was repaired and back in working order on March 10th. While Eagle Mechanical was at the church, they were asked to investigate the lack of heat in the Kitchen/Nursery/Narthex. The thermostat for this area had been set higher on Sunday mornings to try to temper the drafts entering the sanctuary every time the front doors opened. The temperature never seemed to reach the set point. Eagle found that the exhaust fan on the furnace servicing this area had failed which prevented the furnace from running. The fan has been replaced and the furnace is now working.

Sanctuary Ceiling Light Insulation – Thank you Jed Omernick for crawling up, over and through the ceiling trusses over the sanctuary to insulate and close the wood boxes surrounding all the recessed lights in the sanctuary ceiling. These boxes were designed to keep the fiberglass insulation away from the light fixtures because the old incandescent light bulbs generated so much heat. Consequently, the metal fixture boxes were not sealed to allow the heat from the light bulb to dissipate. Now those holes in the metal boxes just let heat from inside the building to escape. The new LED light bulbs generate very little heat so the wood boxes surrounding the metal fixtures can be insulated and sealed. This will prevent the heat from the sanctuary from escaping. It is a good step toward reducing our very high heating bills.

Approval of Meeting Minutes of January 13, 2025.
